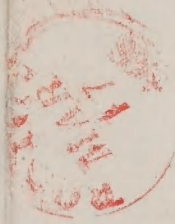

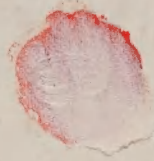

If You will call as
above, You will find a large pack-
age of rare Birds, collected on
Richinchy, (Cotopaxi of Vindob-
ago) to your address - With
You put them to the best use You
can, by raising them yourself, or
distribution where they will be
suitably cared for. They cost
some time & trouble, and I
should be sorry to have them
come to nothing -

There is also a large trunk
filled with collections made
by me in the Alpine regions
mainly, of the Ecuadorian Andes
from 10. to 15.000 ft.

They have cost me for In-
dians, transportation, freight &c.

between \$30 & \$40. which I can
scarcely afford to lose - and
hope - Harniss or You may
be able to reimburse me for
this outlay - There are many
plants no doubt new to the
collections in this country -

If You can - pay Mrs C.
what You think them worth -
but take them at any rate, if
You are going, than I

They were collected for You -
expressly -

I have in fine growth a num-
ber of tubers of a *Dupont alata*,
growing from 12000 feet on Pi-
chinchy - & several roots of
Pitcairnia pungens - which
You can have by calling -
and the tubers ought to be separa-
tib - or the pair broken up -
they are too confined - the
one is a large one - the flowers
You will find in the collection
of plants - large panicles -

I hoped to have got over &
seen You but have been too
busy - I am suddenly called,
to go out to Venezuela - leaving
this afternoon -
